## Chaplain's Message *by Father Tom Cloherty*

My dear Serrans:

March 19th is the feast of St. Joseph. There was a somewhat modern statue of St. Joseph I came across one time. I had passed it quickly and then something caused me to back up and take another look. The statue had no mouth. I had to think about that for a while.

Then I realized what the artist was trying to convey. In all of the New Testament writings there are no recorded words of Joseph. We are always told what he thought, what he dreamed or what he did, but never anything he said. Yet, look at the impact he had on the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary and on the life of Jesus.

We can learn well from the person of St. Joseph. It is not always the words we say out loud that can impact the lives and love of others. The words we say in prayer, in private can influence others. The actions of our lives can speak volumes over and above our words.

Sometimes as Serrans, it is not what we say, but who we are and what we do that has meaning in the lives of others, not to mention our own lives. Saint Francis said, "Proclaim the Gospel, the good news, and if you have to, use words."

Not bad advice to heed and follow!

## USAC Constitution - Objectives and Purposes

At the February meeting your board of directors approved several recommended changes to the USAC constitution and bylaws. The most significant changes involved the statement of USAC's objectives and purposes. If approved, the revised objectives and purposes of USAC will be:

1. *To foster and promote vocations to the ministerial priesthood in the Catholic Church as a particular vocation to service and to support priests in their sacred ministry;*
2. *To encourage and affirm vocations to consecrated religious life in the Catholic Church; and*
3. *To assist its members to recognize and respond in their own lives to God's call to holiness in Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit.*

The rationale for this change is to align USAC's statement of objectives and purposes with those of Serra International. These three items will replace the thirteen in the current constitution. Items four through thirteen are mostly included in Article IX – Serra Councils in the Serra international Bylaws.

## Saint of the Month

March 19<sup>th</sup> - St. Joseph

The Bible pays Joseph the highest compliment: he was a “just” man. The quality meant a lot more than faithfulness in paying debts.

When the Bible speaks of God “justifying” someone, it means that God, the all-holy or “righteous” One, so transforms a person that the individual shares somehow in God’s own holiness, and hence it is really “right” for God to love him or her. In other words, God is not playing games, acting as if we were lovable when we are not.

By saying Joseph was “just,” the Bible means that he was one who was completely open to all that God wanted to do for him. He became holy by opening himself totally to God.

The rest we can easily surmise. Think of the kind of love with which he wooed and won Mary, and the depth of the love they shared during their marriage.

It is no contradiction of Joseph’s manly holiness that he decided to divorce Mary when she was found to be with child. The important words of the Bible are that he planned to do this “quietly” because he was “a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame” (Matthew 1:19).

The just man was simply, joyfully, wholeheartedly obedient to God—in marrying Mary, in naming Jesus, in shepherding the precious pair to Egypt, in bringing them to Nazareth, in the undetermined number of years of quiet faith and courage.

The Bible tells us nothing of Joseph in the years after the return to Nazareth except the incident of finding Jesus in the Temple (see Luke 2:41-51). Perhaps this can be taken to mean that God wants us to realize that the holiest family was like every other family, that the circumstances of life for the holiest family were like those of every family, so that when Jesus’ mysterious nature began to appear, people couldn’t believe that he came from such humble beginnings: “Is he not the carpenter’s son? Is not his mother named Mary...?” (Matthew 13:55a). It was almost as indignant as “Can anything good come from Nazareth?” (John 1:46b).

“He was chosen by the eternal Father as the trustworthy guardian and protector of his greatest treasures, namely, his divine Son and Mary, Joseph’s wife. He carried out this vocation with complete fidelity until at last God called him, saying: ‘Good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of your Lord’” (St. Bernardine of Siena).
